European Parliament plenary

The Plenary Sessions represent the culmination of the legislative work done in committees and in the political groups. These sessions are where the Parliament formally sits to vote on EU legislation and adopt its position on political issues. The Members of the European Parliament meet around once a month in Strasbourg for a four-day part session from Monday to Thursday. In addition to these twelve annual Strasbourg sessions, the Parliament may also meet in additional two-day plenary sessions in Brussels up to six times a year.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Parliament has put in place measures for Members to also participate in the plenary session remotely, while Strasbourg sessions are temporarily suspended. Parliament's political leaders have agreed to allow a temporary alternative remote voting procedure by email for the plenary session on 26 March. All precautionary measures to contain the spread of COVID-19 are kept in place to allow members and staff to ensure the European Parliament's legislative, budgetary and scrutiny functions can be properly exercised.

The current precautionary measures adopted by the European Parliament to contain the spread of COVID-19 do not affect work on legislative priorities. Core activities are reduced, but maintained to ensure that the institution's legislative, budgetary, scrutiny functions are maintained.

Committee meetings

European Parliament's committees are primarily responsible for preparing the legislative work for Parliament's plenary, on the basis of which it adopts legislative resolutions.

Their core task is to draw up reports on legislative proposals that have been referred to Parliament, or on which Parliament has been consulted, and on own-initiative reports.
